

Gunther: I got it from my mom. She's a great seamstress. When I was a kid, she made me all kinds of costumes: Peter Pan, Superman, Woody from Toy Story, you name it. I loved dressing up in those costumes. Gradually, I became interested in the process of making them.

Greg: Some people might say that you were trying to escape your own dull personality by dressing up as fantasy characters.

Gunther: Who would say something like that?

Greg: An interviewer.

Gunther: You think I'm dull?

Greg: You're not exactly Mr. Fascinating.

Gunther: Whose fault is that?


Greg: Let's move on. So you learned to make costumes from your mom.

Gunther: Yes. She taught me to sew. I know, I know. "How nerdy can you get?"

Greg: I didn't say anything.

Gunther: I just wasn't made to be a linebacker, okay? Or a wrestler or a basketball player. I'm non-athletic. I completely lack that gene. I hate P.E..

Greg: I'm a cartoonist. I understand.



Gunther: But I love theater and fantasy and "pretend." I'm not a performer but I'm fascinated by the skills involved in transforming people into characters.

Greg: You do perform magic though, right?

Gunther: I dabble in magic. But I'm no good. I lack the confidence. That's the thing about dressing up - you get to be someone else. When I was in my Superman costume, I wasn't shy, clumsy, uncertain Gunther Berger. I was The Man Of Steel.

Greg: Maybe you should try doing magic as Superman! (Laughs)

Gunther: For a professional humor writer, you're not very funny. Sorry.

Greg: Tell me about your workspace. Do you have your own sewing machine or do you use your mom's?

Gunther: I have my own. And since it's just my mom and me in a 3 bedroom house, I get to use one of the rooms as a workspace. It's where I make all my costumes.

Greg: You just finished a big job, right?

Gunther: Yes, our school's production of "West Side Story." Mr. Fogarty, the director, originally wanted to make the show a contemporary piece. But I talked him into doing it vintage. It was fun to research and create those great old 50's style clothes.

Greg: You could've just dug into the back of my closet. So what are you working on now?

Gunther: I make costumes for Luann to wear at the library when she reads to the kids. I'm currently sketching designs for a panda bear, a spider, Betsy Ross and a robot.

Greg: Wow. Quite a variety.

Gunther: That's the fun of it. I'm not just cutting and stitching cloth. I'm fabricating all kinds of accessories, textures, wigs and appendages. There's even electronics.

Greg: So is this your career path?

Gunther: I think so. I'd like to get a degree in Costume Design. Then work for a theatre troupe or a theme park or something. Or start my own costume company.

Greg: Well, that sounds very ambitious and interesting, Gunther. I take back what I said.

Gunther: What?

Greg: That you're not Mr. Fascinating. You are.

Gunther: Oh. Well. Thank you.
